Letter from the President

With the arrival of fall, the museum is focusing on fundraising and our upcoming Annual General Meeting (AGM) at 7 pm Friday November 16 at the museum. This year's fundraising activities include our Photobooth Flashback fundraiser, Silent Auction, the Christmas bake sale and Toonie tree. Details may be found elsewhere in this newsletter.

At our AGM on Friday, November 16th, members will be electing a partial board. This is explained below. Director and past president John Brennan tendered his resignation from the board in August. On behalf of the board and our membership, I thank John for his years of dedication to the museum.

Our curator, Kristina Parkes, has successfully completed her six-month probationary period and is thereby confirmed in her position. She is bringing fresh energy and new ideas. We will be applying in December for our annual operating grant from the Enderby & District Services Commission (formerly Fortune Parks and Recreation). The Commission will be given a copy of this manual in advance, so that they can appreciate all the work done by your board, its direction and plans for the museum.

2018 Annual General Meeting

This Newsletter is the formal announcement for the Annual General Meeting (AGM) of the Enderby and District Museum Society (EDMS) which will be held at the Museum, 901 George Street, Enderby, B.C. on Friday November 16 at 7 p.m.

Following reports from the President, the Curator and the Treasurer any old or new business will be dealt with, followed by the election of new directors for a two year term and a guest speaker.

Directors completing the second year of their two year terms include Diana Inselberg, Margo Ludwig, Bob Cowan, Sue Weiss, and Neil Bylsma. Faith Hudson is finishing the one year term she assumed when she was appointed to replace Gail Murphy. Current board members John Brennan and Marcy Peel will not be running. As the maximum number of directors on the board is nine, up to four new directors may be elected. Officers of the society, i.e. who of the directors will be president, etc. will be determined at the first meeting of the new Board of Directors.

Nominations for the position of Director will be accepted in writing or by e-mail until 4 pm Saturday November 10. There will be no nominations from the floor during the meeting.

The guest speaker will be Greg McCune, Mayor of the city of Enderby. That decision was made on October 20 by the electorate of Enderby. Before the election, both Mr. McCune, the incumbent, and challenger Herman Halvorson were invited and agreed to speak if elected. Their topic: How they see the museum fitting into Enderby's development over the next four years (their term of office). Refreshments will follow.

Memberships for 2018-2019 are now due – still only \$10 for an individual and \$15 for a family (2 voting members). You can pay before the AGM in the museum or mail to the above address.

Volunteers

While in previous newsletters we highlighted individuals who became museum volunteers recently, as you well know over time much of the museum's work was and is being done by a cadre of long term – some very long term – volunteers.

Two of these are **Bob and Joan Cowan**. In addition to each taking a shift at the front desk, and writing items for the newsletter, this July they took on cleaning out Springbend Hall. There was a lot of deaccessioning (a fancy word for taking things out of the museum's collection) which is done with the agreement of the donor when possible. Four truckloads went for recycling, two to the display in Museum in the Park (a.k.a. Musebo, pronounced like gazebo) and five to the dump.

Three display cases in the Museum in the Park are not required for the museum, but too nice to junk. They are available for take away for free, but be warned that they are very heavy.

Shadow boxes for Remembrance Day

Anyone who created a shadow box last year remembering their family veteran or family member serving now can drop it off at the Legion before Nov 11 and they will display it on the wall.

For anyone who would like to create a shadow box for this year's Remembrance Day, the museum has several for sale, with a price of \$20.15, which was the cost to the museum.

Christmas Time Fundraisers

While this summer's Dutch auction was cancelled because there were not enough donations or volunteers, we are all set for the second Silent Auction which will be held in the museum from November 15th – December 15th.

Last year this event raised \$1000.00. It will feature good quality items such as paintings, glassware, and china, but not limited to those categories. We would welcome donations of quality items for this fundraiser if brought in by November 13th.

Friday November 30 kicks off **Christmas-related activities** in the community, starting with Enderby's Christmas Light Up/Parade. The Museum will be open that night until 8 pm. This will also be the first day of our **Christmas bake sale.**

Members, please bring in your best baking – preferably the day before or during the morning on Friday. On December 1st the museum will be open from 10 am to 4 pm, continuing the bake sale until we sell out.

The **Toonie tree fundraiser** will also start on November 30th, with the draw to take place on December 20th.

Digitization Project - Joan Cowan

The Okanagan Region Historical
Digitization Project is a partnership between the
University of British Columbia's Okanagan
(UBCO) campus and museums and archives
throughout B.C.'s southern interior. Students scan
documents, photographs and maps which are put
online on the Digitized Okanagan History (DOH)
repository on the internet. Thus archival material
is more easily accessible to an audience beyond
the material's location.

As mentioned in last fall's newsletter, in 2017 a large number of photographs from the Enderby & District Museum & Archives were scanned, as well as images and text from Erskine Burnett's hand-published photograph albums, BC's Inland Empire and Shuswap Country. Already we have had folks from throughout B.C. thanking us for sharing Burnett's albums.

Attendance

Nearly 700 visitors were hosted over the 2018 summer season from June to mid-September, which is about 100 fewer than the corresponding period last year. Review of the figures show the drop was on Fridays, associated with the move of the Farmers Market, which brought many casual as well as serious visitors.

Most visitors were from BC and Alberta, with some from other provinces and US states. Others came from New Zealand, Denmark, Turkey, Peru and Czechoslovakia. Mr. F. Grindrod from the UK visited the museum and presumably his namesake hamlet.

Research

All the way from Norway we received the following:

I'm Martin Langaas the great grandson of Karl August Petterson (aka Charlie) who lived and died (Nov 1965) in Enderby. In 1928 (when my mother was only one year of age) my great grandfather immigrated to Canada from Norway. The plan was for my grandmother and her mother to move with him to Canada once he was settled there. It's a little family mystery of what happened next, but my great grandfather never returned to Norway and the family never heard from him again. His whereabouts, life and history were a mystery to my family. In 1965 the Salvation Army notified my Aunt of my great grandfather's death with a letter that he had passed away in Enderby, BC. With the help of the Enderby & District Museum & Archives we managed to track him down in Enderby. In June of this year I went to Enderby from Norway with my Uncle Tormod to try to find his grave and search for relatives.

Thanks to the effort of the Enderby Museum we managed to locate the exact plot where he was buried. We have made arrangements for a gravestone to be set at his burial place. Thank you for the facilitation at the museum in late June. It was a true experience for us to be in Enderby and to follow the patterns and tracks of my great grandfather.

Brendan Morgan came from Seattle to research his wife's family tree.. We were able to tell him we had newspaper references and even a class picture when he initially called, so he came to visit. Here is the email he sent us.

I needed to do some family research on a branch of my wife's family tree for which we had only basic names, dates, and places, and no living family members to provide additional info. I discovered the Enderby Museum on the internet as part of my search for local research resources.

I called the museum to inquire as to what resources they had that might provide any additional information or family biographies. The staff was very gracious with their time, telling me specifically what resources they had available, even looking up in their photo file to see if there were any photos relevant to family members, which indeed there were. That made a trip up from Seattle a worthwhile venture for me to examine what they had found.

The staff was very helpful in locating and scanning the photos for me, and pointed me to other resources in their archives. I was able to find several pictures of family members for whom we had no pictures at all, located grave sites in the vicinity, and several newspaper clippings which provided some additional color to a branch of the family we barely knew.

I have visited several local libraries and museums coast to coast in the United States working on our family tree (this was my first Canadian genealogical visit thus far, but more to come!), and the Enderby Museum and its staff stood out to me as one of the best experiences in my 25+ years doing genealogy, because the staff was abundantly friendly, willing to prepare me beforehand for what I could expect to find, and even had several items pulled and waiting for me to review when I arrived at the museum. I wish all my research experiences have the same organization, generosity, and care that the Enderby Museum showed me!

Most of the 40 or so research requests we received this year were from individuals who did not come as far as Martin and Brendan specifically to visit the Enderby Museum. We also did research for organizations, including the Lumby Museum, the Enderby Chamber of Commerce, the Okanagan Historical Society, Enderby's RiverTalk newspaper, the City of Enderby, and the Splatsin Nation.

Outreach - School Programs

We are making a significant effort to reach out to the local schools (as well as the library) to get kids, and later their friends and parents, into the museum.

Heartwood Learning Community

.. is a formalized public distributed (ie home-based) learning program for eight or more students, organized by and for families who are supported locally by BC certified teachers for certain subjects. Following the BC curriculum and Ministry of Education standards, there are eighteen such communities in the province, including Salmon Arm.

Two teaches, five parents, a grandparent and 20 kids (ages 4-13) from the Salmon Arm Community visited the Museum on Thursday October 18. Two groups alternated between a museum tour by Kristina and a historical walking tour of Enderby led by Bob Cowan, including the Riverwalk, Regent Street and Belvedere, noting St. Andrews and St. George's churches. The students were very well behaved as Bob had predicted, and the tours were well received.

Core 10 students from A. L. Fortune...

.. high school visited the Museum on October 4th and were given a tour of the facility by Kristina and Joan, and the opportunity to view and touch specific artifacts having to do with World War I. They were flabbergasted at what they saw! They were enthralled with the photo books, the exhibits, the typewriter and the rope-making machine. Some did not want to leave. They treated the artifacts with the utmost respect and most hope to visit again. "I would recommend a museum visit to students of any age!" Ms. Field, grade 10 teacher, stated.

More Visitors

Approximately 40 members of the **North Shuswap Historical Society** out of Celista visited the museum in June. They were given a short history of the development of the museum and a history of our community. They really enjoyed wandering the rooms and sharing their knowledge and memories of the many artifacts and photographs on display.

Several members also took back display and research ideas for their own museum in Scotch Creek. The group recently completed a new volume of *Shuswap Chronicles*, which documents history of the Shuswap Lake area.

Our Antique Ropemaking Machine..

.. is by far the most popular hands-on exhibit in the museum, with both youngsters and adults alike wanting to help make their own rope from twine. And it is amazing to see how many friends and relatives are dragged in for rope making by folks who did it when they were kids during a school visit years before.

A problem is that binder and baling twine are obsolete – no longer used, or replaced by plastic – and hence difficult to find, almost antiques themselves.

Herb Higginbottom and Keith Polson recently donated rolls of binder (thin) and bailing (thick) twine allowing us to continue making rope.

Okanagan Historical Society

The Okanagan Historical Society (OHS) 2018 Report, number 82, is now available in the museum.

It contains a very detailed section on the natural and geological history of the area, particularly of the south Okanagan. Bob Cowan wrote an interesting article on the search for oil in the Enderby\Armstrong area in the 1950s. He was able to use the recently donated records and correspondence of the company that came from Patsy Vetter as she was cleaning out some of her father's files. Bob also had a editorial hand in Dale Kermode's story of the creation of Monashee Mountain Provincial Park east of Vernon.

The "Lives Remembered section" contains several essays that may be of interest to Enderby Museum members. Included are Pat Stroulger who served on the board of directors, Peter Roberts longtime Enderby Lions Club member, Doug Main longtime Enderby school teacher and a strong supporter of St. Andrews United Church. Joyace Case, Enderby booster and business woman, Mary Dale, war bride and longtime Kingfisher resident, and Bruce Bolton, strong OHS supporter and area rancher are also remembered.

This 200 page annual publication is available in the gift section at the entrance to the museum for \$25.00. It will also be available for sale at the Enderby Credit Union November 23 and 24 and December 7 and 8. By filling out and submitting a card included in the book, you become a member of the society and your name will appear in the 83rd Report under the list of members.

The Armstrong-Enderby OHS Chapter will have its fall general meeting on Sunday, November 4, 2018 at 2:00 pm at the Armstrong Museum, 3415 Pleasant Valley Rd in Armstrong. Speakers will review the Canadian First World War Internment story in general, and the Vernon Internment Camp in particular.
