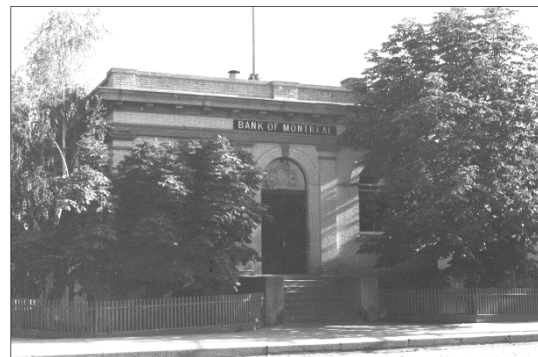

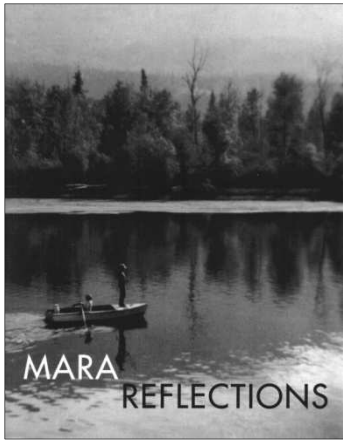

This lovely book tells the story of Mara from the early settlers to after World War II, and it was published in time for Mara's centennial celebrations in 2011.



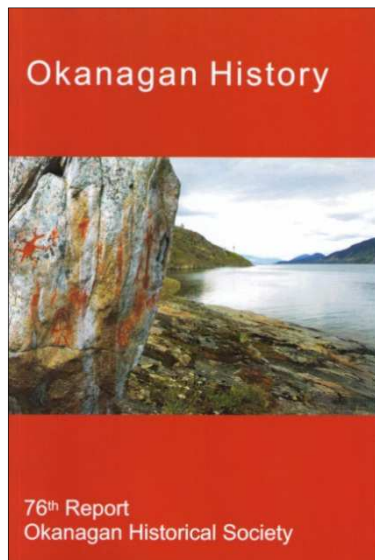
One of the families mentioned in this book are David and Phyllis Couch. Dave will be speaking at the OHS meeting, so you might want to check out this book while you're at the

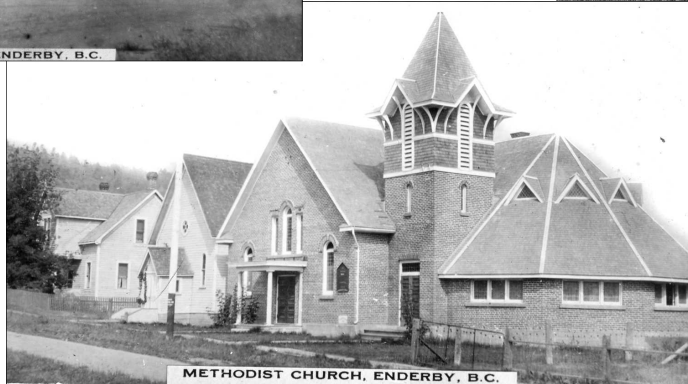
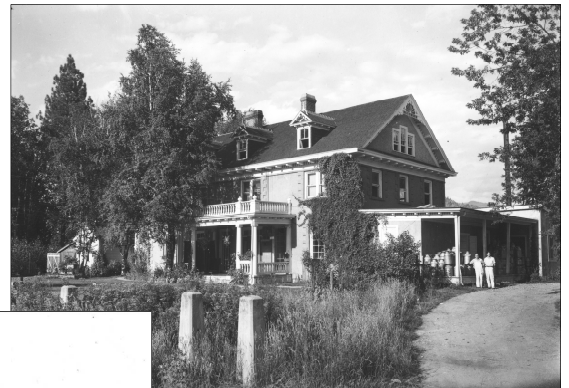
