## Wanted: Enderby Court House Information

Yes, apparently Enderby had its one "Court House". At the same time as the Federal Government was having the Drill Hall built in 1913, the Provincial Government contracted for the construction, north of the hall, of what the newspaper variously called a court house, government office, lockup, and jail. The October 23, 1913 issue describes living quarters for the provincial constable, Mr. Patten, and refers to a court room, cell, and stockade.

The frame building was put up in just two months, compared to twice that long for the brick drill hall. According to museum records in 1945, the building was remodeled as the office and residence for the local public works official, Mr. George Jones. There is little reference to it subsequently, but it is known to have been torn down by 1988 to make room for parking for the hospital.

What we would like to add to museum archives is the court house layout when it functioned as such, i.e. before the modifications of the 1940's. We should be able to do so from your description and newspaper records. Come in anytime during our summer hours, 10:00 am to 4:00 pm, Tuesday to Saturday.

And remember—you don't have to tell us what your role was while you were in the building!
